## PROCLAIM THE NAME OF THE LORD!

As Holy Name members prepare for the annual convention to be held in Minneapolis, Minnesota in September, it is useful and instructive to reflect on the theme for the 2008 convention: Proclaim the Name of the Lord. The work of the convention can be a wonderful opportunity to fulfill the mission of the Holy Name Confraternity. In recent months the Holy Father Benedict XVI has touched upon and even stressed the importance of the Name of Jesus. Just last month,

speaking in Northern Italy, the Pope pointed out that God's Holy Name is not an abstract notion, a faraway ideal, but stressed that "our history depends on God's Name". We are summoned to have a great confidence and love for the Holy Name. The new evangelization cries out for all Catholics to actively bear witness by word

and deed to God's Name. In Jesus Christ, we have the Name and Person who can provide us with all we need to address critical issues in our individual lives.

## 2008 NAHNS CONVENTION

This convention aims to help each of us be more effective in getting this word out.

Business meetings will be held throughout the convention with the goal of enhancing our ability to lead the Holy Name organization more effectively at all levels. Specific working sessions will be focused on three issues of interest to all Holy Name parish groups: attracting new members, fund-raising, and works of mercy within the parish Holy Name Society. our way of thinking. We are not like a political party or other civic or secular organization; we have no other guiding principles than the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Nor should we apologize to others who do not see the value and the efficacy of what we have received, through no merit of our own. We have been given a great gift and we must be like Saint Paul who could not stop preaching Jesus Christ. Just as Saint John could offer no more insight to the Name and Person whom he loved so deeply than to repeat "God is Love and God so loved us as to give His Son for our salvation." We cannot ignore, nor can we neglect the truths of faith that come to us in Jesus Christ. We cannot compromise nor water down the teachings of Jesus Christ just because they are not popular

or acceptable to a world that has lost its way, blinded with its own insufficiencies. We **MUST** proclaim the Name of the Lord and all that this stands for.

Some may get bored and turned off by the pedestrian practices and observances of our religion. But there is nothing wrong with our CATHOLIC FAITH. We have allowed ourselves to nibble at the fringes of our Catholic Faith, get bogged down with bureaucratic detail and officiousness and have lost sight of the powerful energy we have been given in the Name of Jesus and His Church. We have wasted or distorted its beauty and its truth. The Pharisees of the New Testament also misread their religion. Read the Scriptures and see the pattern of an approach to religion and religious practices which Jesus

condemned because it was all wrong. Right now we must go to the house of the Lord and cry out: "Lord be merciful to me a sinner!", and

not stand in prideful and arrogance and say: "Lord, I thank you I am not like the rest of men."

The Confraternity of the most Holy Names of God and Jesus – the Holy Name Society can provide all Catholics with a great opportunity to proclaim God's Holy Name. I want to urge all Holy Name members to ask their local parish officers together with their spiritual advisors to see how this

can best be carried out in your parishes. There are many ways to proclaim God's

Name. I will give you one little hint. Go to the Book of Psalms, that book of Sacred Scripture

which sings eloquently of God's love. You will find in almost every one of the 150 Psalms some reference to God's Name. It is a constant, re-occurring theme. Look it up and meditate on it. I firmly believe it will help you proclaim His Name more convincingly and effectively. Lift up your hearts! And let us lift them up to the Lord!

## PRISON MINISTRY: DO WE MAKE A DIFFERENCE?

**W**e often wonder if our words and actions have any effect upon those with whom we come in contact. The National Holy Name Society Convention each year includes comments and a Presentation by Bud Cope, Lou Manns, and Judy Krantz, who conduct Prison Ministries at various Prisons throughout the United States each year. Recently, they forwarded the following comments from a prisoner, who wrote about his thoughts, and the effect their ministry had on him. This was written by one of the prisoner's who has been coming regularly to retreats and meetings once a month for the last 5 years or so.

Following speech written and given by prisoner Melvin Schwartz, DW-4537:

**T**oday we honor you who give so unselfishly of your time and talents; you who instill in us the values of truth and transformation. You are here, because you have so much to give. We are here, because we have taken so much, betrayed so many, and left behind paths of destruction. For those of us who have lost our way, you are setting the direction for us to align our moral compasses with redemption and restoration. And we thank you.

We need you to lead us to the truth in a morally bankrupt world. In a recent poll, 2/3 of Americans reject the concept of absolute truth. And the Gallop Poll reported 68% agreement with this statement: "There are few moral absolutes. What is right and wrong usually varies from situation to situation." We need you to lead us to the truth in a morally bankrupt world.

This was underscored in the recent visit to America by Pope Benedict XVI, who warned us to beware of the 'dictatorship of relativism.' What is relativism? It is a view that what is true or right for you may not be true or right for me. A teenager today would define relativism

in one word. "Whatever." So much for absolute truth.

Next, we need you to help us transform our wills. In his book, 'JUSTICE THAT RESTORES', Charles Colson is adamant that the only way to reduce crime in America is through moral conversion. . . . a return to values. . . . to family. . . . to God. . . . and to accept personal responsibility – a transformation of our will.

You may know Colson as the founder of Prison Fellowship Ministries and the Angel Tree Project; as a prominent lawyer, lecturer, author, and Special Counsel to former President Richard Nixon. You may remember his involvement in the Watergate scandal, resulting in his doing time in a federal prison in 1975.

Regarding his imprisonment, he wrote this; "The problem, I now realize, is that I had convinced myself that I would do no wrong, yet I slowly and gradually succumbed to peer pressure, and my will was not strong enough to resist. We are never more dangerous", he said, "than when we are self-righteous, and the evidence is overwhelming that when the will is converted, the general result is trans-

formed behavior."

He quotes C.S. Lewis who wrote, "...The will becomes the indispensable ingredient in personal transformation. Only when the will is converted do we have the capacity to do what is right and just; only the transformation of the will can deal with the problem of crime at its roots." Transformation can be defined as changing the human heart, forgiveness, reconciliation and a new view of life.

We need you to help us transform our wills. There is a story – that Thomas Edison's critics chided him for hundreds of failed experiments in his attempts to invent the electric light bulb. "I didn't fail hundreds of times," Edison retorted. "I proved hundreds of times what does not work."

On the issue of crime prevention, Colson cites a long list of policies that prove what does not work; being tough on crime; hanging judges; blaming everything from poverty to racism and on and on. He is convinced that change must come from within.

We need you to help us change from within. In 1998, one out of every 155 Americans was incarcerated. Today,

1 out of every 100 Americans is incarcerated. And the Dept. of Justice Bureau of Statistics is projecting that of those born in 1999, (children who are 9 years old this year), 1 out of every 20 will serve time in prison. For African-Americans, the projection is 1 out of every 4.

How important are YOU to us? That's how important. Your contributions, your sacrifices, your commitments are neither incidental, nor collateral, to our redemption and restoration. They are essential. The values and truths and transformation of our wills are critical not only to our successful re-entry into society, but critical to reversing the destruction and tragedies caused by the ravages of crime.

Today, we celebrate your talents, your commitment and your support in believing in us, guiding us, transforming us, and instilling in us values and truths that we need in order to restore us as useful and productive citizens. We are most grateful to you, the volunteers of S.C. I. Laurel Highlands.

### **Mall of America Shopping Excursion – Thursday, September 25, 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM**

The group will travel via Light Rail (LRT) from downtown Minneapolis to the Mall of America. Visitors will take in the shops, sights, sounds, and tastes of the mall at their leisure. Shoppers will return to downtown Minneapolis in the afternoon via the LRT.

### **Riverboat Cruise & Dinner on the Mississippi River - Thursday, Sept. 25, 6:00 to 9:00 PM.**

A tranquil and beautiful three hour dinner tour by boat of the upper Mississippi River departing from and returning to Boom Island in Minneapolis. The cruise travels along the Grand Rounds Scenic Byway and Heritage Trail, past Nicollet Island and through

the lock at historic St. Anthony Falls. After negotiating the lock, the ship cruises under the Stone Arch Bridge and by Mill City Museum and Mill Ruins Park. Cost for this tour is \$20 per person.

### **St. Paul Domes and Homes Tour - Friday, Sept. 26, 3:30 to 6:00 PM**

The group will travel via motor coach east from downtown Minneapolis to see the domes and homes of Minnesota's capital city, St. Paul. The bus will pass close by the state capital en route to the first tour stop which is the St. Paul Cathedral. A guided tour of the Cathedral helps point out the history and beauty of this Church. Next stop, across the parking lot for a guided tour of the James J. Hill house. Learn the history of the Gilded Age mansion, the man who built it, and its

historic connection to the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis.

The route back to Minneapolis will start down historic Summit Avenue in St. Paul, catching a glimpse of many mansions built in the 1890 to 1920 era. A refreshing stop at a St. Paul neighborhood ice cream shop will complete this tour.

### **Presidents Reception and Convention Banquet - Friday, Sept. 26, 7:00 to 9:00 PM**

The evening schedule starts with the president's reception followed by a wonderful dinner. You will hear talks by Bishop Burbidge and Archbishop Flynn. They will share their insights on spirituality and the Holy Name Society at different points

throughout the evening. National and archdiocesan awards will be given. Cost for this event is only \$35 per person.

### **Mill City Tour - Saturday, Sept. 27, 9:00 to 11:00 AM**

This tour starts with a drive through Minneapolis past the Mary Tyler Moore statue to the Minneapolis Sculpture Garden. Pictures may be taken with the famous spoon bridge and cherry. Next stop is a tour of the Basilica of St. Mary. The final stop on this tour of Minneapolis is the Mill City Museum, a former flour mill on the banks of the Mississippi River now serving as a historical, educational, and entertainment venue. Cost for this tour is \$20 per person.
