Spreading Devotion to the Most Holy Name of Jesus

ST. JOSEPH - A MAN FOR ALL AGES

When Pope John XXIII added the name of Saint Joseph into the Roman Canon in 1962 (Eucharistic Prayer I) he was simply reflecting the teachings of the Doctors of the Church who have long considered Saint Joseph a very special person in the Divine plan of salvation. St. Joseph is considered the patron of so many persons, places, and vocations that it is no wonder that he occupies such a prominent place in everyday Catholic devotional life. He

was named patron of the Universal Church by Pius IX in 1870 and guardian of the Church in its battle with Communism in the 1930's by Pius XI. The institution of the Feast of Joseph the Worker on May 1st by Pius XII was promulgated to help the world meet the evil of the Communist challenge. When we consider the testimony of Sacred Scripture in the infancy narratives of Matthew and Luke and the distinguished line-up of saints who encouraged the devo-

tion to Saint Joseph, such as Bernard of Clairvaux, Thomas Aquinas, Bernardine of Siena and Teresa of Avila for example, it is amazing that it was only in 1324 that Joseph was given a feast day. It is the constant faith of the Church and the devotion of centuries that have set aside Joseph as a very important figure in the economy of salvation.

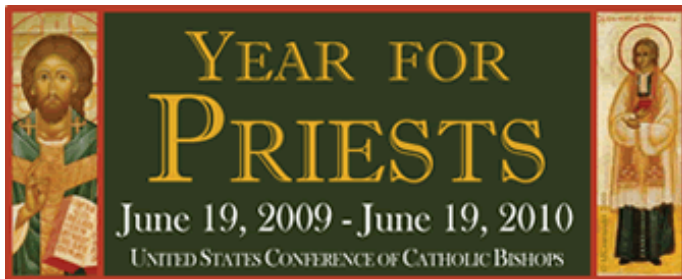
Sacred tradition honors St. Joseph as a "just man." Here the term "just man" means

Pope Benedict XVI has declared a "Year for Priests" beginning with the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus on June 19, 2009. The year will conclude in Rome with an international gathering of priests with the Holy Father on June 19, 2010. The Pope has declared St. John Vian-

ney the Universal Patron of Priests on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of the death of the Curé d'Arns to help commemorate this special year dedicated to the sanctity of priests.

Priests are the greatest benefactors of humanity because it is through them that Christ

continues to re-enact his unique sacrifice for the salvation of humankind. It is through them that he extends his forgiving hands and opens his heart full of Divine Mercy. Called to be the living monuments of Christ's love in the world today, priests spend their whole life, for God and His people. not only honest, upright, and dutiful, but also faithful, obedient to God's will, pure, and true to his vocation as the husband of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the foster father of Jesus.

Over the years some have tried to portray Joseph as an old man, thus providing some supposed credibility to the fact that Mary remained a virgin before, during and after the birth of Jesus.

However, it is pure hypothesis and altogether unnecessary to go to such lengths when it is entirely reasonable and compatible with the facts of He-

brew married life and family relationships, as we now better understand them, to simply accept the fact that Joseph, faced with fantastic challenges, resolved these by his faith in God and his love for the Blessed Virgin Mary.

When we meditate on the loving re-

- Praying the rosary.
- Praying the Chaplet of Divine Mercy.
- Offering Masses for the intention of the priest.

- Eucharistic adoration.
- Offering up to Almighty God your little sacrifices, sufferings, privations of life, etc. for the sanctification of the priest whom you adopt.
- Fast, abstinence, penances, mortifications, etc. as reparation for the sins of the priest.
- Visiting holy places like Marian shrines, grottos, places of pilgrimage.

ST. JOSEPH - A WISE AND LOYAL SERVANT

“No, St. Joseph is not the patron saint of aspirin,” I once had to tell a quick witted student, “he is the patron of a happy death, since he himself died in the arms of Jesus and Mary.” Of course no member of the Holy Name Society would have given his teacher that kind of an answer, right?

St. Joseph, the husband of Mary, the foster father of Jesus, and the patron of workers, is especially dear to those who love the Holy Name of Jesus, because it was to Joseph that the angel revealed that “Jesus” would be the Name of God’s Incarnate Son. In the dream of St. Joseph in Mat-

thew, 1:20-22, the angel urged Joseph not to be afraid and to accept Mary as his wife. Of her Child, the angel said to Joseph, “You shall name Him Jesus, for He will save His people from their sins.”

Every year the Church honors St. Joseph, the foster father of Christ, on March 19th. This feast was kept in various places in Europe in the later Middle Ages, but devotion to St. Joseph began to gain popularity in the fifteenth century through the preaching of St.

Bernardine of Siena (1380-1444) famed also for preaching devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus.

The Preface of the Solemnity of St. Joseph tells us that he is that just man, that wise and

loyal servant, whom God placed at the head of His family.

With a husband’s love, he cherished Mary, the virgin Mother of God. With fatherly care, he watched over Jesus Christ, conceived by power of the Holy Spirit.

The liturgy is careful to indi-

cate, as the Faith has always held, that St. Joseph was not the biological father of Christ whose true Father is God alone and whose mother is the Blessed Virgin Mary. In this careful phrasing of the glories of St. Joseph, the liturgical texts imply the virginal conception of the Savior, the great marvel of the Incarnation, and the privileged role of St. Joseph, witness of the wonder and guardian of the Virgin and her Child.

“The gospel accounts understand the virginal conception of Jesus as a divine work that surpasses all human understanding and possibility. ‘That

which is conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit,' said the angel to Joseph about Mary his fiancée. The Church sees here the fulfillment of the divine promise given through the prophet Isaiah: 'Behold, a virgin shall conceive and bear a son.'" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, #497)

On March 25th, a week after St. Joseph's feast day, the Church

celebrates the Annunciation of the Lord and commemorates the marvel of the Incarnation, namely, that the Word became flesh and dwelt among us. St. Joseph's role was to be the protector of Mary and the foster father of Christ.

In the mid-1900's, when the atheists of the Soviet Union glamorized work and labor in the extravagant celebration of May Day, May 1st, the Church countered with the feast of St. Joseph the Worker on the same date. The spirit of that

feast is summarized in the words of the Catechism, "By His obedience to Mary and Joseph, as well as by His humble work during the long years in Nazareth, Jesus gives us the example of holiness in the daily life of family and work" (CCC, #564).

Every May 1st, in the Opening Prayer of the Mass,

"Inspired by the example of St. Joseph, O Lord, may our lives manifest Your love; may we rejoice for ever in Your peace."

we pray: "O God our Father... with St. Joseph as our example and guide, help us to do the work You have asked and come to the rewards You have promised." Thus the example of St. Joseph reminds us that work is not an end in itself, that there is more to life than this passing world, and that by our toil we build not only the kingdom of this world but the Kingdom of God as well.

Not only do we labor to build the world and the Kingdom of

God here on earth, we also strive to prepare ourselves for eternal life. "The Church encourages us to prepare ourselves for the hour of our death. In the litany of the saints, for instance, she has us pray: 'From a sudden and unforeseen death, deliver us, O Lord;' to ask the Mother of God to intercede for us 'at the hour of our death' in the Hail Mary; and to entrust ourselves to St. Joseph, the patron of a happy death." (CCC, #1014)

As members of the Holy Name Society, we can find in St. Joseph a wonderful example of holiness. With all his friends throughout the world, let us pray in the words of the Communion Prayer of the memorial of St. Joseph the Worker: "Inspired by the example of St. Joseph, O Lord, may our lives manifest Your love; may we rejoice for ever in Your peace."

It is recommended that *The Peoples' Prayer for Priests* be recited throughout the Year (June 19, 2009 through June 19, 2010) for all Priests. All Holy Name Society members are encouraged to recite this prayer at all Holy Name Society sessions, assemblies and conferences.
