A CRITICAL JUNCTURE

The first NAHNS convention to be held in the Southwest was held in Santa Fe, New Mexico from September 23-25. This year's convention presented a great opportunity to reach out to untapped resources in a region which is significantly Catholic and largely Hispanic.

Recently there has been a new emergence throughout the country of a movement which has significant support from some Bishops and pastors. This movement involving Catholic men and

women in standing up for and witnessing their faith in the public arena is promising and needed. Such things as the "Manhattan Declaration" provide a focus for this effort which Holy Name members could well adopt in order to help fulfill their Holy Name pledge. I urge members to look into this movement in your Dioceses.

The technological improvements in reaching out to present the Holy Name message and mission that have been introduced this past year can be an effective and

timely instrument to help us meet the challenges of bringing Jesus and a love of His person and Name to our brothers and sisters starving and thirsting for spiritual nourishment. Using the modern communications media can not only encourage the present members but inspire and attract potential members.

I want to report a new liaison for the Holy Name Society with the Dominican Order in the east and northeast (Saint Joseph Province) in

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

I wish to thank NAHNS 3rd Vice President Ron Schmitz and Region XIII Vice President Benny Bachicha for their efforts in planning this year's convention in Santa Fe, NM. The convention was a great opportunity to promote the Holy Name Society in the American southwest. For the first time in the 40 year history of our organization, we held our national convention in this region! Through the efforts of Region XIII Vice President Benny Bachicha, I was able to speak with some priests from the Santa Fe Deanery about the benefits of the Holy Name Society.

At this past convention our energies were devoted to complete a review of the NAHNS Constitution and Policy Manual. This effort will continue at the Spring Board meeting and will continue up to next year's where we will focus our time to transforming the NAHNS into a more viable organization for the 21st century. One of the goals for this year's convention was to lay the groundwork for a constitutional convention next year in Baltimore since some of the changes to the Policy Manual will require changes to our constitution.

The agenda for this year's convention was a little different from past conventions, with a goal of focusing the delegates

on the most important topics and issues rather than just reviewing reports and information. The Technology Advancement Committee developed an on-line reporting system for regional vice presidents, committee chairmen and diocesan leaders that made it easier for members to submit their reports. A summary of these reports is in this issue of the newsletter for you to review.

It was with deep regret that I informed the delegates that on August 4th, the NAHNS 2nd Vice President Jim Mannion announced his intent to resign from his position. Jim made this decision because of personal and health reasons. In accordance with the NAHNS Constitution, his resignation became effective 10 days later, on August 15th. We will all miss Jim and appreciate all of the hard work, dedication and enthusiasm he gave to the promotion of the Holy Name Society.

At the convention the following changes were approved by the delegates: Ron Schmitz was elected 2nd Vice President; Pete Carbone was elected 3rd Vice President and Ronnie Rome was elected to the Recording Secretary's position.

This past summer, I was contacted by the History Channel.

They were preparing to do a documentary about the History of Profanity. They wanted to look at all perspectives of the subject and were looking for a representative of the Holy Name Society to talk about our philosophy on profanity, since members pledge ourselves against the use profanity and obscene speech. They sent a film crew from New York City to Santa Fe to interview John Bradley and to conduct a video documentary of the NAHNS delegates in action. Look for the airing of this documentary to be early 2011.

Finally, I would like to inform the membership that, on [March 1, 2011](#), I will be retiring. After more than 40 years in the construction industry and 50 plus years in the workforce, I am looking forward to a new lifestyle. This will afford me the time to be more effective in fulfilling my responsibilities as your President. However, I want to remind you that I am always available to any member of our organization. Baltimore Archdiocesan Union HNS

Annual Memorial Mass for deceased members of the Holy Name Society was held at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary on November 3rd. Five years ago the Baltimore Archdiocesan Union was the first organization to hold an event at the newly renovated Basilica. The event was organized by Fr. Michael Carrion, Spiritual Director of the Baltimore Archdiocesan HNU and Deacon Henry Siarkowski.

Fr. Carrion, pastor of Immaculate Heart of Mary parish in Baynesville, sang the national anthem on August 6th at Camden Yards. It was the 56th Annual Holy Name Night at the ballpark. The Baltimore Archdiocesan Union purchases a block of tickets to an Orioles game each year as part of a fund raiser to provide grants for students attending Catholic High Schools in the Archdiocese.

Preparations have begun for hosting the 41st Annual NAHNS National Convention. This will be the 100th Anniversary of the Baltimore Archdiocesan Union. The goal is to provide a meaningful and enjoyable time for Holy Name Society members from all over the country as well as for local members. The Convention will be held at the Tremont Hotel from September 21st through the 25th, 2011.

St. Catharine's Diocesan Union HNS

Nights of reflection are held every other month at Mount Carmel Spiritual Centre in Niagara Falls, Ontario with Mass, a spiritual talk, and general discussion. Although sponsored by the Holy Name Society, the evening is also open to non-members. The St. Catharine's Diocese Annual Holy Name Convention was hosted this year by the men of Immaculate Conception parish and the theme was "Life after Death, Saved by Hope." Pope Benedict's encyclical, *Spe Salvi (In Hope We Are Saved)*, will be highlighted in the presentation.

This year's annual retreat was held the last weekend of October in Derby, NY, with men from both the Diocese of St. Catharine's and the Diocese of Buffalo attending.

March 7th Our Lady of The Scapular parish in Niagara Falls hosted the Annual International Communion Breakfast for Holy Name members and families.

Holy Name members in the Diocese of St. Catharine's continue to support student bursaries, parish ministries, parish and diocesan financial support, Development and Peace, and the St. Vincent De Paul Society. It continues to have the exceptional support and guidance of Spiritual Director Father Peter Rowe, who inspires each meeting with a message of deep faith and hope.

Holy Family Church, Latrobe, PA HNS

The Holy Name Society of Holy Family Church, Latrobe, turned 100 years old Sept. 25, 2010. The Parish community was formed in 1910 following a visit by Carmelite Father Phillip Best, who was conducting a mission at the church. He instigated the movement. Through the outreach of HNS members, the Society grew to as many as 600 active members. In Sept., 1924, the Society embarked on a trip to Washington, D.C. where the President of the United States, Calvin Coolidge, reviewed the HNS members as they marched on parade up Pennsylvania Ave.

Fifty years ago, Bishop William G. Connare, congratulated the organization by commenting, "It is with genuine delight that I join with the members of the Holy Name Society of Holy Family Parish in commemorating their golden years of service to the Church in Latrobe. Uppermost in our thoughts today is our gratitude to God for the privilege of serving Him through the activities of the Society over these intervening years."

The official newsletter of the Holy Name Society of the Church of the Holy Family in Latrobe, PA under editor Paul J. Volkmann (peevee73@verizon.net) is issued monthly and highlighting the history of the parish Society over the past century.

Canonization Cause of Blessed John of Vercelli

Tuesday, November 30, 2010 marked the 727th Anniversary of the death of Blessed John of Vercelli, patron of the Holy Name Society. His Feast Day is December 1st. The 31st Annual Mass for his canonization was celebrated on Sunday, November 21, 2010 at the Church of the Holy Name of Jesus, in Philadelphia, PA. This year's celebration was sponsored by the Philadelphia Archdiocesan Holy Name Union and the National Association of the Holy Name Society.

Honolulu Hawaii Diocesan Union HNS

Mr. Albert C. Souza 102 years young died September 9, 2010 in Kailua, Hawaii. Albert was the oldest member of Saint Patrick's Holy Name Unit, and the oldest member of the Diocesan Union of Holy Name Societies of Honolulu Hawaii. He was a Charter Member of the organization dating back to August 4, 1927. In 2003 The Catholic Charities of Hawaii recognized him as The Island Treasure of Hawaii. The members of the Holy Name Society were Honorary Pallbearers.

San Antonio Archdiocesan Union HNS

An hour of prayer was held on November 21 in honor of the Feast of Christ the King at the Church of St. Gabriel in San Antonio.

A special memorial Mass for deceased members of the Holy Name Society was held on November 7th at the Church of St. Gregory the Great in San Antonio, TX.

NAHNS PRIORITIES AND INITIATIVES

charts below.

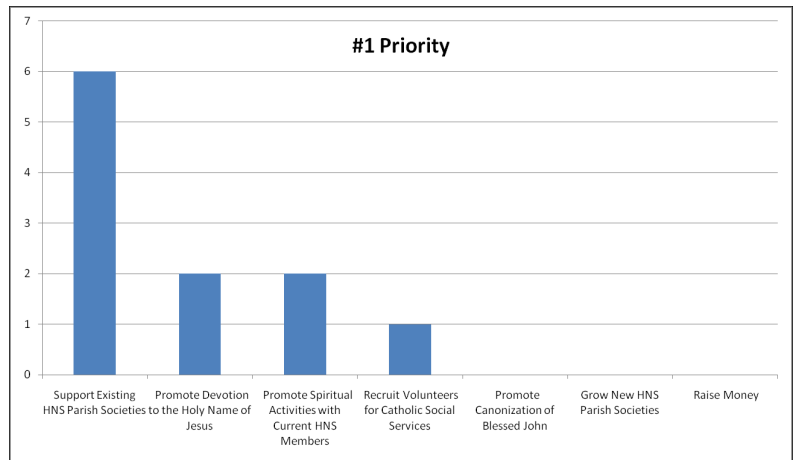
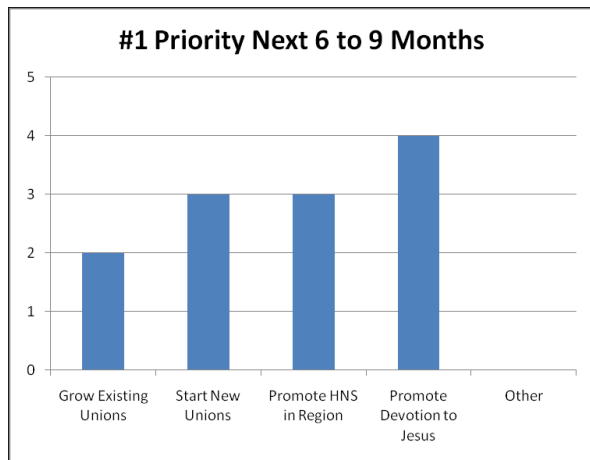
The chart below shows how many Region VP's indicated each particular activity was their #1 priority. For example, four of the Region VP's indicated that promoting devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus is their number one priority

in the region over the next six to nine months.

(Arch)Diocesan Union leaders were also polled to determine what they thought was their highest priority activity over the short term – next 6 to 9 months. As the chart below indicates, supporting existing

Parish Holy Name Societies is the number one priority for the Unions. The next highest priority activity of the (Arch) Diocesan Unions is establishing new parish Holy Name Societies in parishes that currently do not have an active Society.

NAHNS Investigating New On-Line Store

Over the past several years a significant number of members have requested the opportunity to purchase Holy Name Society Supplies over the web using a secure credit card payment system.

The advantages of the on-line store would be to provide clear color images of the merchandise, provide accurate and timely price and shipping information, and to provide faster turnaround times from order to receipt of merchandise. The Executive Board of

the NAHNS has been working with the Technology Advancement Committee to determine the best alternatives for the organization. One of the options is to partner with a Catholic Religious Supply Store to provide this service. This would have the advantage of offering lowest cost implementation and the fastest time to implementation.

This matter will be discussed in full detail at the Spring Board Meeting.

41st Annual National Convention - Baltimore, Maryland

The 41st Annual National Convention of the NAHNS will be held in Baltimore, Maryland from September 22nd through September 25th, 2011.

This convention will be a Constitutional Convention - meaning delegates will be asked to ratify a new Constitution - setting the future direction of the Holy Name Society. Additionally, the host city and Archdiocese of Baltimore have much to offer

in natural beauty, attractions, shops, restaurants, and religious locations and activities.

The delegates to the National Convention held in September in Santa Fe, NM voted to form a new national committee - Life Marriage Family Youth. This new committee will work to promote a culture of life, protect the sanctity of marriage, foster healthy families, and educate and enrich youth. This organizational change focuses efforts on important life and family initiatives while helping to align Holy Name Society members to the initiatives of Catholic bishops around the world.

"The Holy Name Society has an 800 year history of working to promote life, marriage, purity, families, and social justice" said Joe Lapointe, NAHNS president. "The for-

mation of this committee strengthens and focuses the activities within our national organization. Our efforts in the areas of life, marriage, family and youth will be aligned with the ongoing efforts of Catholic bishops and their (Arch)diocesan offices. We can all work together

more effectively to build God's kingdom here on earth."

The Catholic social teaching regarding the dignity of each human remains at the core of this initiative. The central belief is that each person is

uniquely holy and worthy of respect regardless of personal characteristics or circumstances. The unborn, the poor, the disabled, the homeless, the elderly, the ill and injured, the imprisoned, and those on the fringes of any society are equally precious in the eyes of God and are worthy

the person of Father Bruno Shah O.P. recently ordained and in residence at Saint Vincent Ferrer Priory working in the parish there. We also have a new Master of the Order, the Most Reverend Bruno Cadore O. P. just completing his term as Provincial of the Province of France, a medical doctor before he joined the Dominicans, and an expert in bioethics. I have written to him to elicit his support for the Holy Name Apostolate as we received from his predecessor, Fr. Carlos Aspiroz-Costa.

In 2016 the Dominican Order in France will mark the 800th anniversary of its birth and we have been asked to encourage all to pray the Rosary in these years preparing for that anniversary. It is significant that the Dominican Order has been entrusted to two great, powerhouses of prayer: the Confraternity of the Holy Name and the Rosary. I am urging our Holy Name members to use the spiritual resources of the

Rosary and the Holy Name activities that have provided so many benefits to building up the Faith in these years.

As Dominican Promoter of the Holy Name here in our ten Western States, I am overwhelmed by the task of getting the Holy Name Society re-established, and reinvigorated. To do this we need much prayer, the cooperation of Bishops and pastors, the energy and initiative of dedicated Holy Name men and women who will carry the torch. Our Western States are comparatively young and new and they can benefit very much from the example of the Holy Name men and women of previous generations and particularly the Dominicans of Saint Joseph Province. The forces of darkness and evil are hard at work to draw souls away from God and leave them ignorant of Jesus and His love for all. It has been said that all the forces of evil need to do to accomplish their malign

purposes is for enough good people to do nothing. We can, by the grace of God, do much to bring Jesus into the lives of those who do not know Him. If we ask Him in prayer and cooperate with Him in action, the Holy Name Societies can flourish.

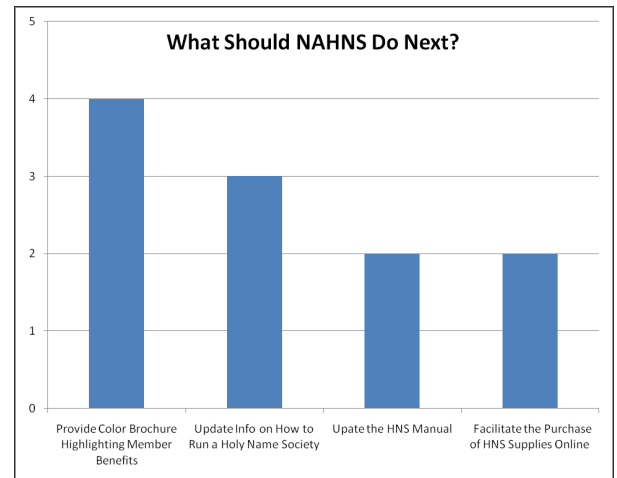
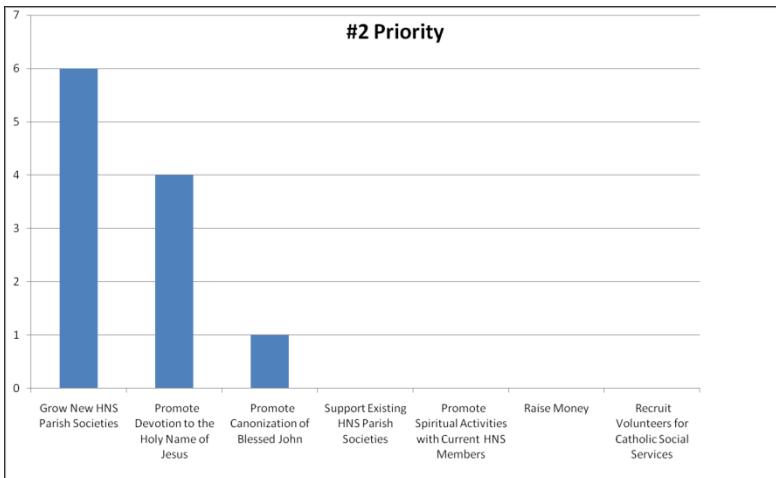
